This paper provides a summary of the grants approved to date, sector detail, approval rates and other updates for Accelerating Commercialisation and the Incubator Support initiative.

Accelerating Commercialisation

Accelerating Commercialisation (AC) was opened for applications on 1 November 2014.

From launch to 31 March 2019, a total of 390 grants have been approved by the Programme Delegate totalling almost \$192 million.

The map below shows the number of approved projects in each state by Sector and the proportion of total funding allocated as a percentage.



Case Study: Earth Radar - Google Maps for what's underground

Earth Radar Pty Ltd was founded in July 2013 to focus on solving key infrastructure sector problems. Globally, underground utility strikes cost billions of dollars and Earth Radar has focused on providing technology that provides faster, more accurate and deeper methods for locating and digitally mapping subsurface utilities. In addition, the company's technology can be utilised in the maintenance of paved roads, highways and airports allowing more accurate pinpointing of required repair and maintenance. Earth Radar has developed a ground penetrating radar (GPR) technology that could be called the Google Maps of what is underground.

Earth Radar accessed \$968,000 of Accelerating Commercialisation funding to develop its GPR technology. Full-scale manufacturing challenges are being overcome rapidly. Accelerating Commercialisation support was used to develop early prototypes, assist with strategic and investor partner connections, and opening opportunities into other government and private market sectors. It helped drive products and services into the global commercial markets by helping to address manufacturing scaling, international distribution and support issues and thorough condition testing of the products under multiple scenarios.

Further, Accelerating Commercialisation was the catalyst for Earth Radar to grow from 8 to 13 employees and for the company to obtain further international orders from Asia and generate interest from the Australian Defence industry.

Incubator Support Initiative

Launched on 20 September 2016, the \$23 million Incubator Support initiative's objective is to assist Australian start-ups to develop the capabilities required to achieve commercial success in international markets and realise their economic potential faster than they otherwise would, and to develop Australia's innovation ecosystem including in regional areas.

Key Statistics

As at 31 March 2019, a total of 111 grants worth over \$18.3 million have been approved across both streams.

New and Existing Incubators

- 38 projects with a total value of over \$15.6 million have been approved \$ 47E(d) S 47E(d)
- 13 NEI projects are primarily delivered in regional areas (seven have accessed the regional grant ratio of 65%). Two projects are being delivered across both metro and regional areas.

Expert in Residence

Expert-in-Residence (EIR) applications are assessed by the department. Applications under \$50,000 are assessed against eligibility criteria only, whereas applications \$50,000 and over are additionally assessed against Merit Criterion 2.

- 73 EIR applications with a total value of over \$2.7 million have been approved.
- 116 experts have been seconded into Australian incubators. Of these:
 - o 38 are female and 78 are male;
 - 37 projects have seconded experts from overseas and 79 projects have seconded experts from within Australia.

Figure 1: Approved projects by state and funding component



Case Studies

New and Existing Incubator project – total grant \$382,000

In May 2018, the University of Wollongong - Bega Campus was awarded \$382,000 for its 'Bega Valley Innovation Hub - Fostering Regional Entrepreneurship' project. Over a two year period, the University of Wollongong, partnering with iAccelerate, will support regional start-ups by rolling out its first regional hub and spoke model in the Bega Valley.

iAccelerate is Australia's most active start-up accelerator and incubator with a focus on developing regional entrepreneurial capabilities to stimulate new economic and job opportunities.

iAccelerate is developing a Regional Entrepreneurial Ecosystem to provide access to iAccelerate's specialised programming and substantial growing support network across the region, Australia and internationally. With a focus on developing regional entrepreneurial capabilities, the program will offer a structured incubator program, national and international mentoring, seed funding, workshops and more to local entrepreneurs looking to develop new business ideas.

Qualifying iAccelerate startups have access to the \$10M iAccelerate Seed Fund that provides critical financial support that can be leveraged for further investment. In order to facilitate reaching entrepreneurs working across the region iAccelerate will support startup hubs in regional communities, the first of which will be the Bega Valley.

A launch was held on 14 March 2019, to officially open the program, and welcome the first cohort of startups. This launch was attended by our \$ 22(1)(a)(ii) who addressed the audience.

Expert-In-Residence projects – total grants worth \$123,540

Under the Expert-in-Resident funding component, the University of Wollongong (North Wollongong Campus) has also been awarded two grants to support its iAccelerate program.

The first grant of \$23,540 was awarded in August 2017 for its 'Workshops and intensive one-on-one's for Social Enterprise Startups' project. \$ 22(1)(a)(ii)

was seconded in to provide mentoring and workshop training for start-ups and social enterprise residents in the iAccelerate program. He also engaged with the iAccelerate IMPACT Conference and Bootcamp for a 6 day period, and provided intensive 'one on ones' with selected start-ups. This project was successfully completed in March 2018.

The second grant was for the maximum amount of \$100,000 that can be awarded under this funding component. The University of Wollongong (North Wollongong Campus) was awarded this grant for its project entitled *'Embedding Design Thinking Capability in iA Educate Program'*. Under this project, US Design Thinking and Innovative Manufacturing expert is joining iAccelerate to deliver training workshops and mentoring support. S 22 will be working with iAccelerate for 12 months with a focus on developing training workshops for our startups and train-the-trainer session for iAccelerate educators to embed this capability in the program. S will also be undertaking a mentor role at iAccelerate to further support our startups in design thinking on a one-to-one basis. The project is due to conclude in January 2020.

The map below shows the number of approved AC projects in each state by Sector and the proportion of total funding allocated as a percentage.



Case Study: Baraja Pty Ltd – 3D laser-eyes for self-driving cars (3D LiDAR)

Baraja Pty Ltd (Baraja) received an Accelerating Commercialisation (AC) grant of \$1 million to bring its LiDAR sensor for self-driving cars to market. The AC support was used to further develop, miniaturise and customise the product as well as to achieve automotive grade qualification and first sales. Baraja's 3D LiDAR overcomes many of LiDAR's previous limitations with a sensor capable of being scaled up to automotive volumes and down to automotive prices. The technology has no moving parts, is small, cheap, ultra-reliable and immune to interference, making it commercially viable for self-driving cars and other applications such as automation equipment and industrial robotics.

The company has taken its staff numbers from five to a staggering 95 and has also raised A\$45 million Series A capital since being founded. The AC grant came after seed funding making an impact that the company says cannot be underestimated. Baraja are competing with the largest and best funded companies in the world.

Baraja now has offices in San Francisco and Shanghai, and have a Japanese distribution agreement. Baraja has also been support by the Entrepreneurs' Programme Innovation Connections element.

Incubator Support Initiative

The \$23 million Incubator Support Initiative (ISI) was launched on 20 September 2016, as an element of the Entrepreneurs' Programme. Funded through to 2019-20, the ISI provides grant assistance to new and existing incubators delivering high quality services to Australian start-ups to help increase their chances of achieving commercial success in international markets and assist them to realise their economic potential faster than they otherwise would.

It also provides incubators with access to top quality research, managerial and technical talent through incoming and outgoing secondments of national or international experts.

Funding is provided through two funding components, New and Existing Incubators (NEI) (up to \$500,000 grants) and Expert-in-Residence (EIR) (up to \$100,000 grants).

First-generation Migrant and Refugee Expansion

During the 2019 Federal Election campaign, the Government announced a \$5m new funding commitment to support first generation migrant and refugee start-up entrepreneurs through the ISI. Program funding has been committed over four years, commencing in 2019-20.

Migrants and refugees are recognised as important contributors to the start-up ecosystem and are known for establishing innovative new businesses and undertaking entrepreneurial pursuits. The expanded initiative will focus on developing the capabilities of first generation migrant and refugee founders to assist them to realise their economic potential in international markets

Draft Program Guidelines have been cleared through central agencies and are currently with the Minister for approval. It is expected that the expanded initiative will be launched early in 2020.



The map below shows the number of approved projects in each state by Sector and the proportion of total funding allocated as a percentage.



Case Study: Lumi.Media – empowering creative teams to work better together.

Lumi Co Pty Ltd (known as Lumi.Media) was founded in 2015 by the Dewey siblings. Combining Karen's sector knowledge and Neil's development skills, they built a cloud-based Software as a Service (SaaS) management and collaboration platform for the entertainment industry. The Lumi platform saves time through touch-of-a-button automation. It captures everything in one system and finds historical content, context and knowledge in an instant.

Commercialisation Adviser Murray Rankin helped Karen and Neil interrogate their business plan more closely. The process enabled and encouraged Lumi. Media to set their path more clearly, which has aided with their early success in attracting high profile clients.

Lumi.Media used \$668,000 of Accelerating Commercialisation funding to scale up their company. They employed another staff member growing their team to eight with three more full time employees to commence as momentum builds.

Lumi. Media has already achieved significant partnerships in the creative media field and is working closely with production companies like CJZ (Bondi Rescue, Go Back to Where you Came From, Muslims like Us, Christians like us), Fremantle Australia (Australia's Got Talent, Neighbours) and Channel Nine/Cavalier (The Block) to make their productions better, faster, cheaper; and importantly, enhancing the delivery of the vision of the producers.

Racing.com is a pioneering partner of Lumi.Media. A joint venture between Racing Victoria and Seven West Media, Racing.com is the media rights holder for Victorian and South Australian thoroughbred racing, as well as broadcasting Hong Kong and other selected international feature race meetings. This partnership has exposed Lumi.Media to a new genre of television production and a global audience.

Incubator Support Initiative

Launched on 20 September 2016, the \$23 million Incubator Support initiative's objective is to assist Australian start-ups to develop the capabilities required to achieve commercial success in international markets and realise their economic potential faster than they otherwise would, and to develop Australia's innovation ecosystem including in regional areas.

Incubator Support Initiative

The \$23 million Incubator Support Initiative (ISI) was launched on 20 September 2016, as an element of the Entrepreneurs' Programme. Funded through to 2019-20, the ISI provides grant assistance to new and existing incubators delivering high quality services to Australian start-ups to help increase their chances of achieving commercial success in international markets and assist them to realise their economic potential faster than they otherwise would.

It also provides incubators with access to top quality research, managerial and technical talent through incoming and outgoing secondments of national or international experts.

Funding is provided through two funding components, New and Existing Incubators (NEI) (up to \$250,000 grants) and Expert-in-Residence (EIR) (up to \$100,000 grants).

First-generation Migrant and Refugee Expansion

During the 2019 Federal Election campaign, the Government announced a \$5 million new funding commitment to support first generation migrant and refugee start-up entrepreneurs through the ISI. Program funding has been committed over four years, commencing in 2019-20.

Migrants and refugees are recognised as important contributors to the start-up ecosystem and are known for establishing innovative new businesses and undertaking entrepreneurial pursuits. The expanded initiative will focus on developing the capabilities of first generation migrant and refugee founders to assist them to realise their economic potential in international markets

The expansion was launched on 4 February 2020; the department will fully brief the Committee about the expansion at the April EPC meeting.

Key Statistics

As at 31 January 2020, a total of 145 grants worth over \$22.6 million have been approved.



The map below shows the number of approved AC projects in each state by Sector and the proportion of total funding allocated as a percentage.



Case Study: FluroSat Pty Ltd - Satellite and drone-enabled crop health monitoring.

FluroSat are an agricultural technology start-up, assisting in crop management to grow more for less. Helping farmers proactively manage their crops, FluroSat's technology FluroSense combines agricultural modelling, remote sensing imaging (from drone, plane and satellite) and machine learning to detect early signs of plant stress and aid proactive management. With adaptive, accurate and actionable analytics, crop growers are able to make better-informed decisions to drive business profitability.

Accessible from PCs, smartphones or tablets, FluroSense, visually highlights stress areas for growers. Farmers and businesses are able to address water and nutrient stress in real time by reducing fertiliser and water waste, and improving their crop yields.

A \$793,737 Accelerating Commercialisation Grant was instrumental in getting the business ready for the future, helping meet ambitious plans to expand to global markets and attracting some of the nation's best venture capital funds as investors. Working with an Entrepreneurs' Programme Commercialisation Adviser provided crucial strategic assistance, to tackle both big and everyday business challenges.

Flurosat have grown from 5 staff to 25 staff, and have recently acquired *ProductionWise* from Grain Growers Limited. Using its FluroSense technology, the business has ground-truthed over 20,000 hectares of crops. Since releasing the FluroSense platform in August 2018, the business has raised an additional \$1 million from investors such as CSIRO Main Sequence Fund.



This paper provides a summary of the grants approved to date, sector detail, approval rates and other updates for Accelerating Commercialisation and the Incubator Support initiative.

Accelerating Commercialisation

Accelerating Commercialisation (AC) was opened for applications on 1 November 2014.

From launch to 31 March 2019, a total of 390 grants have been approved by the Programme Delegate totalling almost \$192 million.

At the 10 April 2019 and 15 May 2019 EPC meetings, 19 applications and one variation was considered. As the Caretaker period commenced soon after the April meeting, the committee recommendations to support ten of the applications and the one variation from those meetings were not yet approved by the Program Delegate as at 31 May 2019.

The map below shows the number of approved projects in each state by Sector and the proportion of total funding allocated as a percentage.



Case Study: . CEC Systems – World-first collapsible shipping container goes global

CEC Systems Pty Ltd pioneering collapsible shipping container aims to address the inefficiency of the global shipping and logistics industry. COLLAPSECON is the world's first semi-automatic collapsible container. Collapsing down to a quarter of its original size, enabling customers to collapse and combine four empty units to form a single container. This drastically cuts costs associated with shipping and sorting empty containers. COLLAPSECON is integrated with tracking technology and a digital platform that lets users analyse the movements and stockpiling of their container fleets.

CEC Systems used their \$282,500 Accelerating Commercialisation grant to enhance the original system through optimisation, prototyping and redevelopment. CEC Systems developed a fully optimised system that was both lighter and had more capacity. Importantly, the system was ready for commercial use. The grant also paved the way for further investment. "It added a level of credibility to the company," says Nicholas Press, founder of CEC Systems. "We had investors commit as a direct result of being awarded the AC Grant." The grant also helped boost sales. "To be able to say to potential customers that the product was supported by the Australian government was a great advantage in engaging with the industry," says Press.

Incubator Support Initiative

The \$23 million Incubator Support Initiative (ISI) was launched on 20 September 2016, as an element of the Entrepreneurs' Programme, funded through to 2019-20. The ISI provides grant assistance to new and existing incubators delivering high quality services to Australian start-ups to help increase their chances of achieving commercial success in international markets and assist them to realise their economic potential faster than they otherwise would. It also provides incubators with access to top quality research, managerial and technical talent through incoming and outgoing secondments of national or international experts.

Funding is provided through two funding components, New and Existing Incubators (NEI) (up to \$500,000 grants) and Expert-in-Residence (EIR) (up to \$100,000 grants)

Key Statistics

As at 31 May 2019, a total of 115 grants worth over \$18.4 million have been approved across both streams. A further three NEI projects, worth just over \$1 million, were supported by the EPC Committee following its 10 April 2019 meeting; however, these are yet to be approved.

Budget Status

S 47E(d)

The EPC is next scheduled to meet

on 27 June 2019, at which time it will consider four new NEI applications.

The Portfolio Budget Statements prescribes a further \$2 million in funding to the ISI on a yearly basis from 2020-21, which will be drawn from the Entrepreneur's Programme budget. This funding is sufficient to support the continued administration of the EIR funding component only. \$47E(d)

Approved Projects

New and Existing Incubators (NEI)

- 38 projects with a total value of over \$15.6 million have been approved \$ 47E(d)
- Of the 38 applications approved, most incubators are open to sectors (10). The greatest number of sector-specific incubators are targeting:
 - MedTech/Health/Biotech sector (7)
 - Agri-tech/food technology sector (7)
 - Advanced manufacturing sector (6);
- 13 NEI projects are primarily delivered in regional areas (seven have accessed the regional grant ratio of 65%). Two projects are being delivered across both metro and regional areas;
- One of the applications supported at the EPC's April meeting will also be regionally located.

Expert in Residence (EIR)

EIR applications are assessed by the department. Applications up to \$50,000 are assessed against eligibility criteria only, whereas applications greater than \$50,000 are additionally assessed against Merit Criterion 2.

- As at 31 May, 77 EIR applications with a total value of just over \$2.8 million have been approved;
- 128 experts have been seconded into Australian incubators. Of these:
 - o 41 are female and 87 are male;
 - o 88 projects have seconded experts from within Australia;
 - 40 projects have seconded international experts from countries including: USA; UK;
 Israel; Singapore; China; Malaysia; Spain; Netherlands; India; Turkey; Germany;
 Sweden; North America; Bosnia and France.

Figure 1: Approved projects (NEI and EIR) by state and funding component



The map below shows the number of approved AC projects in each state by Sector and the proportion of total funding allocated as a percentage.



Case Study: Morse Micro Pty Ltd – Ultra-low power WiFi chip for Internet of Things.

Morse Mircro builds Wi-Fi chips for Internet of Things (IoT) devices, allowing devices to connect at a lower cost, at long-range, and with longer battery life. The company founders, Andrew Terry and Michael De Nil, realised chips designed for phones and PCs were being used for IoT devices despite the fact they were unsuitable. They have developed a better low-power Wi-Fi chip specifically for the IoT revolution, aiming to sell millions of chips right across the globe.

Morse Micro received a \$407,747 Accelerating Commercialisation grant which enabled them to significantly raise the company's profile within the IT and IoT communities, and with investors. It also helped accelerate prototype work, develop patents on its initial low-power Wi-Fi chips and identify potential customers.

Morse Micro's Wi-Fi IoT has gained much interest and support with \$30 million in follow on capital raised from investors. The company has completed three test chips with its first-generation prototype due to commence manufacturing in the millions by mid-2020.

Incubator Support Initiative

The \$23 million Incubator Support Initiative (ISI) was launched on 20 September 2016, as an element of the Entrepreneurs' Programme. Funded through to 2019-20, the ISI provides grant assistance to new and existing incubators delivering high quality services to Australian start-ups to help increase their chances of achieving commercial success in international markets and assist them to realise their economic potential faster than they otherwise would.

It also provides incubators with access to top quality research, managerial and technical talent through incoming and outgoing secondments of national or international experts.

Funding is provided through two funding components, New and Existing Incubators (NEI) (up to \$500,000 grants) and Expert-in-Residence (EIR) (up to \$100,000 grants).

First-generation Migrant and Refugee Expansion

During the 2019 Federal Election campaign, the Government announced a \$5m new funding commitment to support migrant and refugee start-up entrepreneurs through the ISI. Program funding has been committed over four years, commencing in 2019-20.

Migrants and refugees are recognised as important contributors to the start-up ecosystem and are known for establishing innovative new businesses and undertaking entrepreneurial pursuits. The expanded initiative will focus on developing the capabilities of first generation migrant and refugee founders to assist them to realise their economic potential in international markets

- 159 experts have been seconded into Australian incubators. Of these:



Figure 1: Approved projects (NEI and EIR) by state and funding component






