SYS is a Producer, domestic seller and exporter of various hot rolled steel shapes

5. Details of current anti-dumping measures:

Goods description:

The goods subject of the application (the goods) are:

Hot rolled structural steel sections in the following shapes and sizes, whether or not containing alloys:

universal beams (I sections), of a height greater than 130mm and less than 650mm:

universal columns and universal bearing piles (H sections), of a height greater than 130mm and less than 650mm;

Channels (U sections and C sections) of a height greater than 130mm

and less than 400mm; and

Equal and unequal angles (L sections), with a combined leg length of greater than 200mm.

Sections and/or shapes in the dimensions described above, that have minimal processing, such as cutting, drilling or painting do not exclude the goods from coverage of the application.

Goods excluded from this application are:

hot rolled "T" shaped sections, sheet pile sections and hot rolled merchant bar shaped sections, such as rounds, squares, flats, hexagons, sleepers and rails; and sections manufactured from welded plate (e.g. welded beams and welded columns)

Tariff classification:

Goods identified as hot rolled non-alloy steel sections as set out in section 3.3 are classified to the following tariff subheadings in Schedule 3 to the Customs Tariff Act 1995:

On 20 November 2014, the then Minister for Home Affairs published a dumping duty notice for Hot Rolled Structural Steel Sections exported to Australia from Japan, The Republic of Korea, Taiwan and The Kingdom of Thailand

B. APPLICATIONS FOR REVIEW OF VARIABLE FACTORS

1) Factors to be reviewed

SYS is requesting a review of the variable factors linked to the significant changes in the **normal value** and <u>exports prices</u> during the period since the imposition of measures compared to the period of investigation upon which the measures are based.

2) The amount by which that factor is likely to have changed since anti-dumping measures were last imposed, and evidence in support.

Amount of change in normal value

A comparison of SYS normal value during the original investigation period (1 October 2012 to 30 September 2013) upon which the measures are based and the twelve month period since the imposition of measures (Jan - Dec 2015) shows a very significant change in domestic prices between the periods concerned.

Based on the SYS data published in REP 223 and converted in to THB, the weighted average Fas normal value over the original investigation period was THB per tonne with a CTMS of THB per tonne.

During the period Jan - Dec 2015 (Form B602 - Application for a review of anti-dumping measures Anti-Dumping Commission) the weighted average FAS normal value is lower at THB per tonne with a CTMS of HB per tonne.

The table as Appendix 1 shows monthly SYS prices for Jan - Dec 2015 monthly

The weighted average FAS normal values on a de-aggregated basis for H sections during the period Jan- Dec 2015 was THB per tonne and the CTMS during the same period was THB per tonne.

The table as Appendix 2 shows monthly SYS prices for H sections for Jan-Dec 2015, as well as the monthly CTMS.

Amount of change in export prices

The Export prices of SYS were established pursuant to s. 269TAB(1)(a) of the Act, being the price paid by the importer less transport and other costs arising after exportation.

Based on the SYS data published in REP 223 and converted to THB, the weighted average export price over the original investigation period was THB per tonne.

Based on the period Jan - Dec 2015 (Form B602 - Application for a review of anti-dumping measures Anti-Dumping Commission), the weighted average FAS export prices of SYS is higher at THB per tonne,.The table Appendix 1 shows monthly SYS prices for Jan - Dec 2015.

Revised dumping margin

The methodology adopted by the Commission with respect to the findings reached in the final report no No. 223 are fully respected:


- -The model comparison between normal value and export prices is upheld. The Commission considered HRS sold domestically by SYS to have characteristics closely resembling those of the goods exported to Australia during the investigation period. The Commission is therefore satisfied that HRS sold by SYS on the domestic market in Thailand are like goods in accordance with s. 269T(1). The Commission in section 7.7.2, like goods and grade comparisons outlined its position on the most appropriate grades for comparison purposes to the exported G300.
- Normal values for certain exported models were determined under s.269TAC(1) based on domestic sales of like goods sold in the ordinary course of trade at the same level of trade as export sales. To ensure the comparability of normal values to export prices, the Commission made the following adjustments pursuant to s.269TAC(8) of the Act, namely domestic inland freight, domestic credit terms, level of trade and export inland freight.
- The Commission compared the weighted average of export prices (at FAS terms) over the whole of the investigation period with the weighted average of corresponding normal values (at FAS terms) over the whole of that period.

Consistent with the approach adopted in the original investigation, a comparison of the changed normal value and export price on a FAS basis results in a negative dumping margin of

The changes in normal value and export prices are lasting in nature for the following reasons:


1. SYS has adopted a policy of lowering domestic prices to encourage the market to switch from rebar steel to product section steel, especially in the conventional construction sector.

The result of this policy can be seen from the following tables witnessing a growth in consumption of section steel which is expected to continue well into the future.

- 2. In order to support this marketing switch to production section steel, SYS is extending the product scope to include the grade SS 400 which is perceived as being competitively priced.
- 3. Lower domestic prices have also been facilitated by the lowering of the cost of scrap as can be seen from the following charts

Although scrap prices are increasing in 2016, this does not affect the pricing policy on the domestic market which is to maintain prices, even at lower profits margins, to ensure that the trends in the increased consumption of section steel in the

In this respect, the weighted average domestic prices for H sections in the first two months of 2016 was THB per tonne. with a weighted average CTMS of THB per tonne.
4. On the export side, SYS is focusing on a better and flexible service to end-user to improve value added. The support to end-users is also being developed by sending smaller lots and also improving delivery schedules
