## **ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2018/36**

**INQUIRY CONCERNING THE CONTINUATION OF ANTI-DUMPING  
MEASURES AND REVIEW OF ANTI-DUMPING MEASURES APPLYING**

**TO**

**ZINC COATED (GALVANISED) STEEL EXPORTED TO AUSTRALIA  
FROM THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA, THE REPUBLIC OF  
KOREA AND TAIWAN**

**AND**

**ALUMINIUM ZINC COATED STEEL EXPORTED TO AUSTRALIA FROM  
THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA AND THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA**

**Extension of time granted to issue  
Statement of Essential Facts and Final Report in relation to a  
continuation inquiry and review of measures**

*Customs Act 1901 – Part XVB*

On 10 November 2017, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission initiated an inquiry into whether the continuation of anti-dumping measures in respect of certain zinc coated (galvanised) steel exported to Australia from the People's Republic of China (China), the Republic of Korea (Korea) and Taiwan and aluminium zinc coated steel exported to Australia from China and Korea is justified. The background to the initiation of these inquiries is contained in Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2017/156, ADN 2017/157, ADN 2017/158 and ADN 2017/159.

The initiation notices advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) for the inquiries would be placed on the public record on or before 28 February 2018. The initiation notices also advised that a recommendation to the Assistant Minister for Science, Jobs and Innovation and the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Jobs and Innovation (the Parliamentary Secretary)<sup>1</sup> would be made in a final report on or before 14 April 2018.

To properly consider whether the anti-dumping measures should continue and whether

the notice is to remain unaltered or whether the notice is to have effect as if the Minister had fixed different variable factors, I, Paul Sexton, General Manager, Investigations, requested an extension of time under subsections 269ZHI(1)(f) and 269ZHI(1)(g) of the *Customs Act 1901* (the Act) to the deadline for the Commissioner to publish the SEF, and for the Commissioner to provide his final report and recommendation to the Parliamentary Secretary.<sup>2</sup>

The Commissioner has, under subsection 269ZHI(3) of the Act,<sup>3</sup> extended the deadline to publish the SEF and to provide his final report and recommendations. The SEF will now be placed on the public record no later than 30 April 2018. Interested parties are invited to make submissions in response to the SEF within 20 days of the SEF being placed on the public record.

The Commissioner's recommendation will now be made in a report due on or before 14 June 2018.
