**HOT ROLLED STRUCTURAL STEEL EXPORTED TO AUSTRALIA
FROM THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA**

**Note for File — Extension of time for submissions in response to
Statement of Essential Facts No. 465**

On 30 July 2018, the Anti-Dumping Commission (the Commission) published Statement of Essential Facts No. 465 (SEF 465) in relation to the review of measures no. 465. This review is examining whether the variable factors relevant to the taking of anti-dumping measures, in respect of hot rolled structural steel sections exported to Australia from Korea, have changed. SEF 465 advised that interested parties were to lodge submissions to SEF 465 no later than 20 August 2018.

The Commission received a request for an extension of time to respond to SEF 465 by an interested party.

Paul Sexton, General Manager of the Anti-Dumping Commission has given due consideration to this extension request, having regard to the circumstances of interested parties, the circumstances of the case and the *Customs (Extensions of Time and Non-Cooperation) Direction 2015*.¹ An extension of time for all interested parties to respond to SEF 465 has been granted. As a result, interested parties are to lodge submissions to SEF 465 no later than **24 August 2018**.

The Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (the Commissioner) is not obliged to have regard to any submission made in response to SEF 465 received after this date if to do so would, in the opinion of the Commissioner, prevent the timely preparation of the final report to the Assistant Minister for Science, Jobs and Innovation (Assistant Minister).²

Unless an extension is allowed, the Commissioner must report to the Assistant Minister by 11 September 2018.

¹ From 19 December 2016, the Commissioner delegated his powers to consider and decide requests for extensions of time to the General Managers of the Commission. This delegation was made under Delegation Instrument No. 2 of 2016.

² On 20 December 2017, the Prime Minister appointed the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Jobs and Innovation as the Assistant Minister for Science, Jobs and Innovation. For the purposes of this review the Assistant Minister is the relevant decision maker.
