## **ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2017/48**

Customs Act 1901 - Part XVB

## Certain Aluminium Zinc Coated Steel Exported from the People's Republic of China and the Republic of Korea

## Findings in Relation to Three Reviews of Anti-Dumping Measures

Notice under subsection 269ZDB(1)(a)(iii) of the Customs Act 1901 and subsection 8(5) of the Customs Tariff (Anti-Dumping) Act 1975

The Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission has completed three reviews, which were initiated on 30 August 2016 and 22 September 2016, of the anti-dumping measures applying to certain aluminium zinc coated steel (the goods) exported to Australia from the People's Republic of China (China). Each review was limited to examining whether the variable factors relevant to the taking of the anti-dumping measures as they affect each applicant should be varied.

The following table includes details of each of the three reviews.

Recommendations resulting from each review, reasons for the recommendations and material findings of fact and law in relation to each of the reviews are contained in *Anti-Dumping Commission Report No. 365, 366, 367, 368, 371, 372, 374, 375 and 376* (the Final Report).

I, CRAIG LAUNDY, Assistant Minister for Industry, Innovation and Science and Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Industry, Innovation and Science (the Parliamentary Secretary),¹ have considered the above-mentioned report and have decided

to accept the recommendations and reasons for the recommendations, including all the material findings of facts and law.

Under subsection 269ZDB(1)(a)(iii) of the *Customs Act 1901* (the Act), I DECLARE that, for the purposes of the Act and the *Customs Tariff (Anti-Dumping) Act 1975* (Dumping Duty Act), that, with effect from the date of publication of this notice, the dumping duty notice currently applying to aluminium zinc coated steel exported to Australia from China, and the Republic of Korea in relation to:

- Zongcheng,
- Angang, and
- YP Technomaterial,

be taken to have effect as if I had fixed different variable factors in respect of each of these exporters, relevant to the determination of duty.

To preserve confidentiality, details of the revised variable factors being the Ascertained Export Price (AEP), Ascertained Normal Value (ANV) and Non-Injurious Price (NIP) will not be published.

I, CRAIG LAUNDY, the Parliamentary Secretary, <u>DETERMINE</u>, pursuant to section 8(5) of the Dumping Duty Act, that the interim dumping duty (IDD) payable on aluminium zinc coated steel exported to Australia by

- Zongcheng,
- Angang, and
- YP Technomaterial,

be an amount worked out in accordance with the combination of fixed and variable duty method pursuant to subsections 5(2) and (3) of the *Customs Tariff (Anti-Dumping) Regulation 2013*, as detailed in the table below, to take effect the day following publication of this notice.

As outlined in the Final Report, for each exporter, the NIP has been set as equal to their respective ANV. As such, I was not required to and did not have regard to the lesser duty rule under subsection 8(5B) of the Dumping Duty Act.

The variable factors set for these exporters is confidential.
