**ALUMINIUM EXTRUSIONS EXPORTED THROUGH ONE OR MORE
THIRD COUNTRIES FROM THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA**

MEETING WITH ULLRICH ALUMINIUM

21 November 2017

Meeting Summary

The Commission met with Ullrich Aluminium (Ullrich) on 21 November 2017. During this meeting the Commission provided Ullrich with an overview of the anti-circumvention inquiry initiated on 16 October 2017. Ullrich confirmed support for the inquiry noting it would refer any parties offering transshipment services to the Commission's investigation team. The Commission was then taken on a site tour of the South East Queensland distribution facility.

The visit was conducted to provide information to the Australian industry member and to seek further evidence and information pertaining to the inquiry.

The matters discussed were as follows:

The Goods and Like Goods

Jukka provided an introduction to the inquiry and the purpose of the visit, including the preparation of a file note for the public record and the responsibility of the Anti-Dumping Commission and its officers to maintain confidentiality in respect of information and data.

Jukka explained that the purpose of the visit is to seek evidence on circumvention and was meeting with members of the industry to seek information, conduct plant tours and to gain knowledge on market and industry practices that may be of assistance in relation to obtaining evidence from importers and exporters.

Jukka asked Ullrich to provide evidence or other information, including names of individuals or businesses, if it was able to do so, that may be of assistance to the inquiry.

Jukka invited Ullrich to pass on his details to any other parties that may be interested or could provide further information to assist the inquiry.

Ullrich undertook to provide to the inquiry any further evidence or information they may acquire.

Ullrich provided an overview of its business and its manufacturing process.

Further discussion was conducted regarding the Australian market and the impact of imports of aluminium extrusions.

Jukka reiterated his invitation to Ullrich to provide any further information or evidence that may assist the inquiry.
