Dear Sir,

I apologise for not replying to your letter of 23rd March sooner. I have been overseas.

I would like to have my name added to your list of interested parties.

None of the companies listed as manufacturers of Aluminium Extrusions has supplied us with goods, however we have dealt with **Foshan Yaoyinshan Aluminium Co Ltd** and would like to make a submission on their behalf.

My concerns are:

1. Aluminium extrusions are not the only goods which are imported from China in huge quantities, affecting Australian manufacturing . Practically everything we buy seems be made in China. (toys, clothes, shoes, plastic goods, hardware etc). All these goods should be subject to anti-dumping tax if it is applied to aluminium extrusions.

Therefore, singling out Aluminium extrusion for a tax seems vindictive.

2. Because there is a tax protecting Australian made Aluminium Extrusions, those Australian companies put their prices up to an unreasonable level, which forces purchasers to look elsewhere. They effectively have a monopoly within Australia.

3. This affects all Chinese companies trying to export to Australia , not just those mentioned. Others are too small to fight their case.

4. Some Chinese Exporters of Aluminium Extrusions already have a reduced tax level, giving them an advantage over other Chinese companies. This should be equal for all exporters.

5. There is supposed to be a free trade agreement between Australia and China.
