Discussed:

- Moulis Legal requested a meeting with the Anti-Dumping Commission (the Commission) to discuss SSAB Australia and SSAB EMEA AB's involvement in the Quenched and Tempered steel plate (Q&T steel plate) investigation.
- Moulis Legal reinforced its client's views regarding superior quality and global brand name recognition of Swedish Q&T steel plate. Moulis Legal referred to presentations and submissions previously provided to the Commission. These documents will be either summarised in verification visit reports for SSAB Australia and SSAB Emea or have already been published on the Commission's public record.
- Moulis Legal provided a confidential chart summarising SSAB Australia's market intelligence for Q&T steel plate prices in 2013. SSAB claimed that this chart demonstrated that SSAB Australia's prices were higher than competitors' prices during the POI. Moulis Legal explained SSAB Australia's views regarding the conditions of competition between exported goods and like goods that are domestically produced. Moulis Legal advised that a pending submission for the public record would include a non-confidential summary of the information in the chart, as well as dealing with other matters.
- The Commission explained its preliminary export price methodology for Sweden in relation to preliminary affirmative determination report 234.

PUBLIC RECORD

- Moulis Legal reinforced its client's views outlined in a submission uploaded to the public record on 4 April 2014. In particular, SSAB Australia does not believe that Q&T steel plate exported from Sweden caused injury to the Australian industry.
