



ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2017/94

Certain Aluminium Extrusions

Exported to Australia from the People's Republic of China

Extension of Time Granted to Issue the Statement of Essential Facts and Final Report

Review of Anti-Dumping Measures No. 392

Customs Act 1901 – Part XVB

On 23 March 2017, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (the Commissioner) published a notice (initiation notice) announcing the initiation of a review of the anti-dumping measures (in the form of a dumping duty notice and a countervailing duty notice) applying to certain aluminium extrusions (the goods) exported to Australia from the People's Republic of China as they affect exporters of those goods generally.

A full description of the goods is available in Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2017/38, which was published on the Anti-Dumping Commission's (the Commission) website at www.adcommission.gov.au on 23 March 2017.

The initiation notice advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) for the review would be placed on the public record on or before 11 July 2017. The initiation notice also advised that a final report and recommendation to the Assistant Minister for Industry, Innovation and Science and Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Industry, Innovation and Science (the Parliamentary Secretary)¹ would be provided by 25 August 2017.

The SEF will set out the facts on which the Commissioner proposes to base his recommendation to the Parliamentary Secretary.

The final report will set out the Commissioner's recommendation to the Parliamentary Secretary in relation to whether the relevant dumping duty notice and countervailing duty notice remain unaltered or have effect in relation to a particular exporter or exporters of the goods generally from China as if different variable factors had been ascertained.

To enable the Commission to complete examination and verification of exporter questionnaire responses in relation to the exports of selected exporters for this review, I, Paul Sexton, General Manager, Investigations, requested an extension to the deadline for the Commissioner to publish the SEF, and to provide his final report and recommendation

to the Parliamentary Secretary, under subsection 269ZHI(1) of the *Customs Act 1901* (the Act).²

The Commissioner has, under subsection 269ZHI(3) of the Act,³ extended the deadline to publish the SEF and to provide his final report and recommendation to the Parliamentary Secretary by 45 days.

The SEF will now be placed on the public record on or before **25 August 2017**. Interested parties are invited to make submissions to the Commissioner in response to the SEF within 20 days of the SEF being placed on the public record. A recommendation will now be made to the Parliamentary Secretary in a final report due on or before **9 October 2017**.
