Investigation into Alleged Dumping of Certain Aluminium Extrusions exported to Australia from the People's Republic of China by Guangdong Jiangsheng Aluminium Co., Ltd and Guangdong Zhongya Aluminium Company Ltd; and the Kingdom of Thailand

**Extension of time granted to issue
Statement of Essential Facts and Final Report**

Customs Act 1901 – Part XVB

On 19 October 2017, Dale Seymour, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (the Commissioner) published a notice announcing the initiation of an investigation into the alleged dumping of certain aluminium extrusions (the goods) exported to Australia from the People's Republic of China by Guangdong Jiangsheng Aluminium Co., Ltd and Guangdong Zhongya Aluminium Company Ltd; and the Kingdom of Thailand.

The background to the initiation of this investigation and a full description of the goods is contained in Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2017/144.

ADN No. 2017/144 advised that the Statement of Essential Facts (SEF) would be placed on the public record by 6 February 2018. It also advised that a recommendation to the relevant Minister would be made in a final report on or before 23 March 2018.

An extension to the SEF and final report was subsequently granted. ADN No. 2018/11 advised that the SEF would be placed on the public record by 30 April 2018. It also advised that a recommendation to the relevant Minister would be made in a final report on or before 14 June 2018.

The Anti-Dumping Commission (the Commission) requires further time to finalise the verification of information that has been provided by interested parties and to further examine the injury and causation claims made by the Australian industry. I, Paul Sexton, General Manager, Investigations, requested an extension of time, under subsections 269ZHI(1)(a) and 269ZHI(1)(b) of the *Customs Act 1901* (the Act), to the deadline for the Commissioner¹ to publish the SEF, and for the Commissioner to provide his final report and recommendation to the Assistant Minister for Science, Jobs and Innovation

(Assistant Minister).²

The Commissioner has, under subsection 269ZHI(3) of the Act,³ extended the deadline to publish the SEF to 9 June 2018⁴ and to provide his final report and recommendations.

Interested parties are invited to make submissions in response to the SEF within 20 days of the SEF being placed on the public record.

If the investigation is not terminated earlier, a recommendation to the Assistant Minister in relation to this investigation will be made in a report due on or before 24 July 2018.
