INVESTIGATION INTO THE ALLEGED DUMPING OF SILICONE EMULSION CONCRETE ADMIXTURES FROM THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

On 14 August 2009 the Australian Customs and Border Protection Service (Customs and Border Protection) initiated an investigation into the alleged dumping of silicone emulsion concrete admixtures (SECA) exported to Australia from the United States of America. This follows an application for a dumping duty notice made by Tech-Dry Building Protection Systems Pty Ltd, the sole Australian manufacturer of SECA.

The locally made SECA product manufactured by Tech-Dry is sold and marketed under the brand **Tech-Dry Block Emulsion**.

The imported SECA product is sold and marketed by BASF Construction Chemicals Australia under the trade name **Rheopel Plus**.

Dumping occurs where a product is exported to Australia at a price below its normal selling price in the country of export. If the dumping is causing material injury to the industry producing the same or similar goods in Australia, the Minister for Home Affairs, the Minister responsible for Customs and Border Protection, may decide to impose dumping duties on the imported goods in order to remove that injury.

Tech-Dry alleges that the goods (SECA) have been exported from the USA to Australia at prices less than their normal value and that the dumping has caused material injury to the Australian industry through:

- lost sales volume:
- lost market share;
- price undercutting;
- price suppression;
- price depression; and
- reduced profits and profitability

Customs and Border Protection understands that your company is an end user of SECA and would appreciate your cooperation in this investigation. A questionnaire is attached for this purpose relating to your purchases of SECA for the period since July 2007.

Completing this questionnaire is <u>not compulsory</u>. However, your assistance will help Customs and Border Protection to assess whether, and if so how, the Australian industry is suffering material injury caused by exports of SECA from the USA. Please take the time to review the attached questions and provide the most accurate information you can. The information you provide will be held inconfidence and will not be provided to any third party without your express approval.

It is a requirement that Customs and Border Protection publish a non-confidential version of all information to which it has regard during this investigation. As such, Customs and Border Protection will place on the public file a blank copy of this questionnaire and will publish a list of the companies who provide a response. Customs and Border Protection will report the consolidated results of the questionnaire but will not attribute any comments to a particular respondent. No other information you provide will be placed on the public file.

Customs and Border Protection may seek the opportunity to visit you to discuss matters relevant to its investigations.


