



Anti-Dumping Notice No. 2026/076

Aluminium Extrusions exported to Australia from Malaysia and the Socialist Republic of Vietnam

Customs Act 1901 (Cth) - Part XVB

The Anti-Dumping Commission (the commission) has prepared this notice to set out the current measures, and the relevant background relating to the current measures, that apply to Aluminium Extrusions (the goods) exported to Australia from Malaysia and the Socialist Republic of Vietnam (Vietnam).

On 21 May 2026, the Minister for Industry and Innovation and Minister for Science (the Minister) made a decision following merits review by the Anti-Dumping Review Panel (the ADRP or the Panel) and judicial review by the Federal Court of Australia (Federal Court).

The Minister's decision **continues anti-dumping measures** applying to the goods exported from Malaysia and Vietnam. The measures take effect from **22 May 2026**, the date of publication of the Minister's notice on the ADRP's website.¹ The expiry date of the measures is **22 May 2031**.

The decision accepting the Panel's recommendations has effect as if different variable factors had been fixed:

- For PMB Aluminium Sdn Bhd (PMBA), as determined in *Anti-Dumping Report No. 591* (REP 591) and the commission's report dated 20 February 2026 in so far as it relates to PMBA's revised normal value and dumping margin; and
- For all other exporters of the goods from Malaysia and Vietnam, as determined in REP 591.

Particulars of the effective rates of interim dumping duty applicable to exports of aluminium extrusions are set out in Table 1.

Background

On 24 August 2021, Capral Limited (Capral), the Australian industry producing the like goods, applied to the Commissioner to continue anti-dumping measures of aluminium extrusions exported from Malaysia and Vietnam. The anti-dumping measures were in the form of a dumping duty notice and a countervailing duty notice.

On 24 June 2022, following the continuation inquiry, the then Minister for Industry and Science (former Minister) accepted the recommendation of the Commissioner in REP 591 to not continue measures.

On 12 July 2022, Capral sought review² by the Panel of the Minister's decision to not continue the measures, referred to as the Reviewable Decision in this notice.³ On 17 August 2022, the Panel initiated ADRP Review No 155 and on 19 September 2023, provided its report to the former Minister (Report No 155).⁴

On 14 December 2023, the former Minister accepted the Panel's recommendations in ADRP Report No 155, revoked the Reviewable Decision and substituted a new decision. The Substitute Decision, published on the Panel's website on 15 December 2023, reinstated and continued the anti-dumping measures, in the form of a dumping duty notice, applying to the goods exported from Malaysia and Vietnam with variable factors fixed in accordance with REP 591.⁵

On 23 January 2024, Press Metal Aluminium (Australia) Pty Ltd and PMBA jointly applied for judicial review of the Substitute Decision. On 19 November 2025, the Federal Court, by consent, made orders that set aside the Substitute Decision ; set aside the recommendation of the Panel and quashed Report No 155; and set aside

the ascertainment of the normal value and dumping margin for PMBA in REP 591⁶.
The Court:

- remitted the matter to the commission for preparation of a report and recommendation on the normal value and dumping margin for PMBA to be provided to the Panel which was provided on 20 February 2026.
- required the Panel to prepare a report for the Minister under section 269ZZK of the Act in response to Capral's application of 12 July 2022 following receipt of the commission's report⁷, which was provided on 22 April 2026 (Report No 155A).
- required the Minister to make the decision within 30 business days of the receipt of the report from the Panel.

On 21 May 2026, the Minister in making the decision to continue the measures accepted the recommendations, and reasons for the recommendations, made by the ADRP. In ADRP Report No 155A, the Panel recommended that the previous decision be revoked and substituted with a new specified decision to continue the anti-dumping measures applying to aluminium extrusions exported from Malaysia and Vietnam.
