Revocation Review and Review of Anti-Dumping Measures No 667

Aluminium extrusions Exported from Malaysia by PMB Aluminium Sdn Bhd

Case resumption and Extension of time granted to issue the Statement of Essential Facts and Final Report

Customs Act 1901 (Cth) - Part XVB

Case resumption

On 28 March 2025, I, David Latina, Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (the commission), published a notice initiating Review 667, a revocation review and review of variable factors in relation to anti-dumping measures applying to certain aluminium extrusions (the goods) exported to Australia from Malaysia by PMB Aluminium Sdn Bhd.¹ On 16 January 2026, I advised that I had suspended my consideration of Review 667 as set out in Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) 2026/011.

I am now resuming my consideration of Review 667 following the Minister's decision to reinstate and continue the measures the subject of Review 667 discussed below.

By way of background, on 20 November 2025, the Federal Court of Australia (the Court) issued orders² setting aside the former Minister's decision to reinstate and continue the measures published 15 December 2023.³ The Court remitted the matter to the commission and the Anti-Dumping Review Panel for reconsideration, with the

Minister for Industry and Innovation and Minister for Science (the Minister) to remake the decision. As a result of the Court orders, the measures the subject of Review 667 were no longer in effect. Therefore, I suspended Review 667 pending the Minister remaking the decision.⁴

On 22 May 2026, the Anti-Dumping Review Panel published a notice from the Minister revoking the former Minister's decision and substituting it with a new decision to reinstate and continue the measures, taking effect from that date until 22 May 2031.⁵ The Minister's decision followed the Panel's recommendation set out in Anti-Dumping Review Panel Report 155A.⁶ The new decision reinstated and continued measures the subject of Review 667.⁷

New milestone dates

Under section 269ZHI(3) of the Act, I⁸ have decided to extend the due date to publish the Statement of Essential Facts (SEF) and provide the final report and recommendation to the Minister.⁹

SEF – The SEF is now due to be placed on the public record on, or before, **11 November 2026**.

Final report – A recommendation to the Minister will be made in a final report which is now due on, or before, **9 February 2027**.

Basis for extension

The Deputy Commissioner Investigations of the commission requested an extension of the due date to publish the SEF and to provide the final report and recommendation to the Minister.¹⁰

The extension aims to allow time for the commission to undertake necessary casework after the case was suspended, and to allow time for the commission to gather and analyse new information.

Interested parties may lodge further submissions and information

I have decided to provide additional time for interested parties to lodge submissions upon resuming this review.
