Resealable can end closures

Exported from Malaysia, the Republic of Philippines and the Republic of Singapore

Extension of time granted to issue the Statement of Essential Facts and the Final Report in relation to a Review of Anti-Dumping Measures No. 496

Customs Act 1901 - Part XVB

On 27 November 2018, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commissioner) published a notice announcing the initiation of a review of anti-dumping measures, in the form of a dumping duty notice, in respect of resealable can end closures exported to Australia from Malaysia, the Republic of Philippines and the Republic of Singapore. The review is limited to examining whether the variable factors relevant to the taking of the anti-dumping measures as they affect Genpacco Inc. from the Philippines should be varied.

A full description of the goods is available in that notice, Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2018/180 (initiation notice). The initiation notice is available on the Anti-Dumping Commission's (Commission) website at www.adcommission.gov.au.

The initiation notice advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) would be placed on the public record on or before 18 March 2019. The initiation notice also advised that a recommendation to the then Assistant Minister for Industry, Innovation and Science and the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Industry, Innovation and Science would be made in a final report on or before 1 May 2019.

To enable the Anti-Dumping Commission (the Commission) to properly complete its analysis of the variable factors relevant to the anti-dumping measures, I, Paul Sexton, General Manager, Anti-Dumping Commission, requested an extension of the deadline for the Commissioner to publish the SEF and provide his final report and recommendation to the Minister for Industry, Science and Technology (the Minister).¹

On 14 March 2019, the Commissioner, under subsection 269ZHI(3) of the Customs

Act 1901,² extended the deadline to publish the SEF, and provide his final report and recommendation.

The SEF will now be placed on the public record on or before 29 June 2019. Interested parties are invited to make submissions to the Commissioner in response to the SEF within 20 days of the SEF being placed on the public record.

A recommendation to the Minister will now be made in a report due on or before 13 August 2019.
