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## **ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2019/133**

### **Certain Grinding Balls exported from the People's Republic of China Extension of time granted to issue the Statement of Essential Facts and the Final Report in relation to a Review of Anti-Dumping Measures No. 520**

*Customs Act 1901 – Part XVB*

On 22 July 2019, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commissioner) published a notice announcing the initiation of a review of anti-dumping measures, in the form of a dumping duty notice and a countervailing duty notice, in respect of certain grinding balls (the goods) exported to Australia from the People's Republic of China as they affect exporters of those goods generally.

A full description of the goods is available in that notice, Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2019/096 (initiation notice). The initiation notice is available on the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commission) website at [www.adcommission.gov.au](http://www.adcommission.gov.au).

The initiation notice advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) would be placed on the public record on or before 9 November 2019. The initiation notice also advised that a recommendation to the Minister for Industry, Science and Technology (the Minister) would be made in a final report on or before 24 December 2019.

Due to delays in the timing of the Commission's verification activities, I, Paul Sexton, General Manager, Investigations, requested under subsection 269ZHI(1)(d) and (e) of the *Customs Act 1901* (the Act) an extension of the deadline for the Commissioner to publish the SEF and provide his final report and recommendation to the Minister.<sup>1</sup>

The Commissioner has, under subsection 269ZHI(3) of the Act,<sup>2</sup> extended the deadline to publish the SEF, and provide his final report and recommendation.

The SEF will now be placed on the public record on or before **7 February 2020**. Interested parties are invited to make submissions to the Commissioner in response to the SEF within 20 days of the SEF being placed on the public record. A recommendation to the Minister will now be made in a report due on or before **23 March 2020**.
