## **ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2020/51**

## Certain Grinding Balls exported from the People's Republic of China

Further extension of time granted to issue the Statement of Essential Facts and the Final Report in relation to a Review of Anti-Dumping Measures No. 520

Customs Act 1901 - Part XVB

On 22 July 2019, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commissioner) published a notice announcing the initiation of a review of anti-dumping measures, in the form of a dumping duty notice and a countervailing duty notice, in respect of certain grinding balls (the goods) exported to Australia from the People's Republic of China (China) as they affect exporters of those goods generally.

A full description of the goods is available in that notice, Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2019/096 (initiation notice). The initiation notice is available on the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commission) website at <a href="https://www.adcommission.gov.au">www.adcommission.gov.au</a>.

The initiation notice advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) would be placed on the public record on, or before, 9 November 2019, and that a recommendation to the Minister for Industry, Science and Technology (the Minister) would be made in a final report on, or before, 24 December 2019. As advised in ADN Nos. 2019/133, 2020/9 and 2020/34, the Commissioner has previously extended these deadlines. The SEF is currently due to be placed on the public record on, or before, 19 May 2020, and a recommendation provided to the Minister in a report on, or before, 3 July 2020.

Due to a number of issues still to be resolved around the calculations of normal value and dumping margins, I, Paul Sexton, General Manager, Investigations, requested under sections 269ZHI(1)(d) and (e) of the *Customs Act 1901* (the Act) a further extension of the deadline for the Commissioner to publish the SEF and provide his final report and recommendation to the Minister.<sup>1</sup>

The Commissioner has, under subsection 269ZHI(3) of the Act,<sup>2</sup> extended the deadline to publish the SEF, and provide his final report and recommendation. The SEF will now be placed on the public record on or before **30 June 2020**.

Interested parties are invited to make submissions to the Commissioner in response to the SEF within 20 days of the SEF being placed on the public record. A recommendation to the Minister will now be made in a report due on or before **14 August 2020**.
