



ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2020/076

Aluminium extrusions exported from the People's Republic of China

Extension of time granted to issue the Statement of Essential Facts and the Final Report in relation to a Continuation Inquiry into Anti-Dumping Measures No. 543

Customs Act 1901 (Cth) – Part XVB

On 13 February 2020, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (the Commissioner) published a notice announcing the initiation of a continuation inquiry (the inquiry) into the anti-dumping measures applying to aluminium extrusions (the goods) exported to Australia from the People's Republic of China (China).

A full description of the goods and the current anti-dumping measures is available in that notice, Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2020/017 (initiation notice).

The initiation notice advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) would be placed on the public record on or before 2 June 2020. The initiation notice also advised that a recommendation to the Minister for Industry, Science and Technology (the Minister) would be made in a final report on or before 17 July 2020. As advised in ADN No. 2020/056, the Commissioner has previously extended this deadline. The SEF is currently due to be placed on the public record on or before 17 July 2020, and a recommendation provided to the Minister in a report on or before 31 August 2020.

Due to a number of issues still to be resolved around the approach to, and the calculation of, variable factors, I, Paul Sexton, General Manager, Investigations, requested an extension of the deadline for the Commissioner to publish the SEF and provide his final report and recommendation to the Minister.¹

The Commissioner has, under section 269ZHI(3) of the *Customs Act 1901* (Cth), extended the deadline to publish the SEF, and provide his final report and recommendation.² The SEF will now be placed on the public record on or before **31 July 2020**.

Interested parties are invited to make submissions to the Commissioner in response to the SEF within 20 days of the SEF being placed on the public record. A recommendation to
