



## **ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2021/140**

### **Copper tube exported to Australia from the People's Republic of China and the Republic of Korea**

#### **Investigation No. 557 into alleged Dumping and Subsidisation**

#### **Extension of time granted to issue the Final Report**

*Customs Act 1901 – Part XVB*

On 13 July 2020, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commissioner) published a notice announcing the initiation of an investigation into the alleged dumping and subsidisation of copper tube (the goods) exported to Australia from the People's Republic of China and the alleged dumping of the goods exported to Australia from the Republic of Korea. A full description of the goods is available in Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2020/071 available on the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commission) website at [www.adcommission.gov.au](http://www.adcommission.gov.au) (initiation notice).

The initiation notice advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) would be placed on the public record by 2 November 2020.<sup>1</sup> The initiation notice also advised that a recommendation to the Minister would be made in a final report on, or before, 15 December 2020. As advised in ADN No. 2021/102, the Commissioner has previously extended these deadlines. The SEF was published on the public record on 14 September 2021, and a recommendation is to be provided to the Minister in a report on or before 29 October 2021.

A further extension to the time period for providing the final report and recommendation to the Minister has been requested.<sup>2</sup> The extension was requested so that submissions made by interested parties in response to the SEF and received up to 27 October 2021 could be fully considered. The extension of time has not been sought to allow further submissions to the investigation.

In order to fully consider issues raised in the application, responses to the importer, exporter and government questionnaires and submissions, I, Justin Wickes, Acting General Manager, Investigations of the Anti-Dumping Commission, requested an

extension of the deadline for the Commissioner to provide his final report and recommendation to the Minister.

The Commissioner has, under section 269ZHI(3) of the Act, extended the deadline to provide the final report and recommendation.<sup>3</sup>

A recommendation to the Minister will now be made in a report due on, or before, **12 November 2021**, unless terminated on this date or earlier.
