



ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2020/115

Aluminium zinc coated steel of a width equal to or greater than 600 millimeters

Exported to Australia from the Republic of Korea, Taiwan and the Socialist Republic of Vietnam

Investigation No. 558 into Alleged Dumping and Subsidisation

Extension of time granted to issue the Statement of Essential Facts and the Final Report

Customs Act 1901 (Cth) – Part XVB

On 30 June 2020, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commissioner) published a notice announcing the initiation of an investigation into the alleged dumping and subsidisation of aluminium zinc coated steel of a width equal to or greater than 600 millimeters (the goods) exported to Australia from the Socialist Republic of Vietnam, and the alleged dumping of the goods exported to Australia the Republic of Korea and Taiwan.

A full description of the goods is available in Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2020/067 available on the Anti-Dumping Commission's (Commission) website at www.adcommission.gov.au (initiation notice).

The initiation notice advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) would be placed on the public record by 19 October 2020.¹ The SEF will set out the facts on which the Commissioner proposes to base his recommendations to the Minister for Industry, Science and Technology (the Minister) in relation to this investigation.

The initiation notice also advised that a recommendation to the Minister would be made in a final report on, or before, 2 December 2020.

The COVID-19 pandemic has impacted interested parties, delaying the preparation of their responses to information requests. It has also affected the ability of Commission staff to undertake verification of information within the usual timeframes.

As a result of the delays associated with the COVID-19 pandemic, I, Paul Sexton, General Manager, Investigations of the Anti-Dumping Commission, requested an extension of the deadline for the Commissioner to publish the SEF and provide his

final report and recommendation to the Minister.²

The Commissioner has, under section 269ZHI(3) of the Act, extended the deadline to publish the SEF, and provide the final report and recommendation.³

The SEF will now be placed on the public record no later than **7 March 2021**.⁴

Interested parties are invited to make submissions to the Commissioner in response to the SEF within 20 days of the SEF being placed on the public record.

A recommendation to the Minister will now be made in a report due on, or before, **21 April 2021**.
