



## **ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2021/114**

**Aluminium zinc coated steel of a width equal to or  
greater than 600 millimetres**

**Exported to Australia from  
the Republic of Korea, Taiwan and  
the Socialist Republic of Vietnam**

**Investigation No. 558 into Alleged Dumping and  
Subsidisation**

**Extension of time granted to issue the  
Statement of Essential Facts and the Final Report**

*Customs Act 1901 (Cth) – Part XV B*

On 30 June 2020, the then Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission, Mr Dale Seymour, published a notice announcing the initiation of an investigation into the alleged dumping and subsidisation of aluminium zinc coated steel of a width equal to, or greater than, 600 millimetres (the goods).

Specifically, the investigation examines the alleged dumping and subsidisation of the goods exported to Australia from the Socialist Republic of Vietnam and the alleged dumping of the goods exported to Australia from the Republic of Korea and Taiwan.

A full description of the goods is available in Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2020/067 (the initiation notice) on the Anti-Dumping Commission's (Commission) website at: [www.adcommission.gov.au](http://www.adcommission.gov.au).

The initiation notice advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) would be placed on the public record by 19 October 2020.<sup>1</sup> The SEF sets out the facts on which the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (the Commissioner) proposes to base his recommendations to the Minister for Industry, Science and Technology (the Minister) in relation to this investigation. The initiation notice also advised that a recommendation to the Minister would be made in a final report on, or before, 2 December 2020.

The time period for providing the final report and recommendation to the Minister

was extended.<sup>2</sup> The SEF is currently due to be placed on the public record by 3 September 2021, and the recommendation to the Minister is currently due in a final report on, or before, 27 October 2021.

I, Paul Sexton, General Manager, Investigations, have requested another extension of the deadline for the Commissioner to publish the SEF and provide his final report and recommendation to the Minister.<sup>3</sup> The reason for my request is due to delays caused by Covid 19 in completing verification activities and in order to fully consider issues raised in submissions from interested parties.

The Commissioner has, under section 269ZHI(3) of the Act, extended the deadline to publish the SEF, and provide the final report and recommendation.<sup>4</sup>

The SEF will now be placed on the public record no later than **22 September 2021**.

Interested parties are invited to make submissions to the Commissioner in response to the SEF within 20 days of the SEF being placed on the public record.

A recommendation to the Minister will now be made in a report due on, or before, **15 November 2021**.
