



ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2021/057

Steel reinforcing bar

Exported from the Republic of Korea and Spain (except Nervacero S.A.)

Extension of time granted to issue the Statement of Essential Facts and the Final Report in relation to Review of Anti-Dumping Measures No. 566

Customs Act 1901 – Part XVB

On 10 September 2020, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commissioner) published a notice announcing the initiation of a review of anti-dumping measures, in the form of a dumping duty notice, in respect of steel reinforcing bar (the goods) exported to Australia from the Republic of Korea and Spain (except Nervacero S.A.) as they affect exporters of those goods generally.¹

A full description of the goods is available in that notice, Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2020/102 (initiation notice). The initiation notice is available on the Anti-Dumping Commission's (Commission) website at www.adcommission.gov.au.

The initiation notice advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) would be placed on the public record on or before 29 December 2020. The initiation notice also advised that a recommendation to the Minister for Industry, Science and Technology would be made in a final report on or before 12 February 2021.

The Commissioner previously approved a request for an extension to the time periods for publishing the SEF and providing his final report and recommendation to the Minister.²

Due to resourcing constraints, and to provide further time to complete the verification phase of the review and have full consideration of the available information in preparing the SEF, I, Justin Wickes, Acting General Manager Investigations, Anti-Dumping Commission, requested a further extension of the deadline for the

Commissioner to publish the SEF and provide his final report and recommendation to the Minister.³

The Commissioner has, under section 269ZHI(3) of the *Customs Act 1901*,⁴ extended the deadline to publish the SEF, and provide his final report and recommendation.

The SEF will now be placed on the public record on or before **27 July 2021**. Interested parties are invited to make submissions to the Commissioner in response to the SEF within 20 days of the SEF being placed on the public record.

A recommendation to the Minister will now be made in a report due on or before **15 September 2021**.
