



ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2021/143

Clear float glass

Exported to Australia from Malaysia and the United Arab Emirates

Extension of time granted to issue the Statement of Essential Facts and the Final Report in relation to Investigation No 582

Customs Act 1901 – Part XVB

On 27 April 2021, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commissioner) published a notice (initiation notice)¹ announcing the initiation of an investigation into the alleged dumping of clear float glass (the goods²) exported to Australia from Malaysia and the United Arab Emirates (UAE), and the alleged subsidisation of the goods exported to Australia from Malaysia.

The initiation notice advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) would be placed on the public record by 16 August 2021.³ The SEF will set out the facts on which the Commissioner proposes to base his recommendations to the Minister for Industry, Science and Technology (the Minister) in relation to this investigation. The initiation notice also advised that recommendations to the Minister would be made in a final report on or before 29 September 2021.

Following the initiation notice, the Commissioner extended the deadline for publishing the SEF and providing recommendations in the final report to the Minister.⁴ The SEF is currently due to be placed on the public record by 5 November 2021, and recommendations to the Minister are due in a final report on or before 19 January 2022.

I, Justin Wickes, Acting General Manager, Investigations, requested an additional extension to the deadline for the Commissioner to publish the SEF and provide his

final report and recommendations to the Minister.⁵ My reasons for the request are due to case complexities which require the commission to conduct further analysis. The Commissioner is also providing additional time for interested parties to make submissions to the SEF to account for a reduced activity period and public holidays which occur over the Christmas and New Year period.

The Commissioner has, under section 269ZHI(3) of the Act, extended the deadline to publish the SEF, and to provide the final report and recommendations to the Minister.⁶

The SEF will now be placed on the public record by **14 December 2021**. Interested parties are invited to make submissions to the Commissioner in response to the SEF within 34 days (20 days provided for under the Act plus additional time to account for the reduced activity period and public holidays) of the SEF being placed on the public record.

A recommendation to the Minister will now be made in a report due on, or before, **18 February 2022**.
