



ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2022/064

Investigation No 584

Alleged dumping of certain merchant bar

Exported to Australia from Taiwan

Extension of time granted to issue the final report

Customs Act 1901 (Cth) – Part XV B

On 31 May 2021, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commissioner) published a notice (initiation notice) announcing the initiation of an investigation into the alleged dumping of certain merchant bar (the goods) exported to Australia from Taiwan.¹

The initiation notice advised that the Commissioner's recommendations would be made in a final report on, or before, 3 November 2021.

As advised in previously published Anti-Dumping Notices (ADNs), the Commissioner extended the due dates to publish the SEF and provide the final report to the then Minister for Industry, Science and Technology. The Commissioner was due to make a recommendation to the Minister in a final report on, or before, 5 July 2022.

On 8 June 2022, the Commissioner granted an extension to all interested parties to respond to *Statement of Essential Facts No. 584* (SEF 584).² The commission has received several submissions to SEF 584.³

As a consequence of extending the time for interested parties to respond to SEF 584, and to allow additional time for the commission to consider the submissions it has received, I, Rhys Piper, Acting General Manager (Investigations), requested a further extension of the due date for the Commissioner to provide his final report and recommendation to the Minister for Industry and Science (the Minister).⁴

The Commissioner has, under section 269ZHI(3) of the *Customs Act 1901* (the Act), extended the due date to provide the final report and recommendation to the Minister.⁵
