



ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2021/156

Aluminium Extrusions

Exported from Malaysia and the Socialist Republic of Vietnam

Extension of time granted to issue the Statement of Essential Facts and the Final Report in relation to Continuation No. 591

Customs Act 1901 – Part XVB

On 15 September 2021, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commissioner) published a notice announcing the initiation of an inquiry into whether the continuation of anti-dumping measures in respect of aluminium extrusions (the goods) exported to Australia from Malaysia and the Socialist Republic of Vietnam, is justified.

A full description of the goods is available in that notice, Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2021/119, available on the Anti-Dumping Commission (commission) website at www.adcommission.gov.au.

The notice advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) would be placed on the public record by 4 January 2022.¹ The SEF will set out the facts on which the Commissioner proposes to base his recommendations to the Minister for Industry, Energy and Emissions Reduction (the Minister) in relation to this investigation.

The notice also advised that a recommendation to the Minister would be made in a final report on or before 17 February 2022.

To provide further time to complete the verification phase of the inquiry and give full consideration to the available information in preparing the SEF and report to the Minister, I, Isolde Lueckenhausen, General Manager, Investigations of the Anti-Dumping Commission, requested an extension of the deadline for the Commissioner to publish the SEF and provide his final report and recommendation to the Minister.²

The Commissioner has, under section 269ZHI(3) of the *Customs Act 1901*, extended the deadline to publish the SEF, and provide his final report and recommendation.³

¹ Note that 110 days from the date of initiation is 3 January 2022. As this day is a public holiday, the deadline becomes the next business day, 4 January 2022.

The SEF will now be placed on the public record no later than **4 March 2022**. Interested parties are invited to make submissions to the Commissioner in response to the SEF within 20 days of the SEF being placed on the public record.

A recommendation to the Minister will now be made in a report due on or before **13 May 2022**.
