**Zinc Coated (Galvanised) Steel and Aluminium Zinc Coated Steel
exported from the People's Republic of China**

The Anti-Dumping Review Panel (ADRP) has completed a review of decisions by the then Attorney- General to publish: dumping duty notices in respect of certain coated steel products zinc coated (galvanised) steel and aluminium zinc coated steel exported from the People's Republic of China (China) and the Republic of Korea (Korea); and countervailing duty notices in relation to the same products exported from China. The decisions were published on 5 August 2013. A full description of the goods is available in ACDN 2012/40 (relating to the initiation) and ACDN No. 2012/62 (relating to the clarification of the goods). These ACDNs are available at the Commission's website www.adcommission.gov.au.

The application for review was made by the Ministry of Commerce of China and relates only to exports from China. A copy of the application and the ADRP Report to me is available on the ADRP website www.adreviewpanel.gov.au

The ADRP Report recommended that I: affirm the decisions under review to publish dumping duty notices; and revoke the decisions under review to publish countervailing duty notices. The ADRP Report also noted that if I accepted those recommendations, there may be a need to adjust the interim dumping duty rate that was imposed, to remove any deduction made due to countervailable subsidy amounts that would no longer apply.

I, ROBERT BALDWIN, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Industry, have considered and accepted the recommendation to affirm the decisions to publish dumping duty notices, including all material findings of fact or law relating to that recommendation as set out in the ADRP Report. I have also considered and accepted the findings of the ADRP Report, including all material findings of fact and law, in relation to the grounds for review of the decision to publish the countervailing duty notices. However, I do not accept the recommendation to revoke the countervailing duty notices. The only grounds for review in relation to the countervailing duty notices were in relation to subsidy programs 1 to 3 described in International Trade Remedies Report 193 (Report 193). No complaint was made in relation to the determination of countervailable subsidies under other subsidy programs described in Report 193 and mentioned in the countervailing duty notices. Nor did the ADRP review any of the findings in Report 193 in relation to the other subsidy programs. In these circumstances I have decided to vary the countervailing duty notices so as to reduce the countervailing subsidies by the amounts referable to programs 1 to 3.

I AFFIRM the decisions to publish dumping duty notices. I have also decided to increase some of the rates of interim dumping duty imposed by the dumping duty notices, with effect from 5 August 2013, so as to remove deductions that had been made due to countervailable subsidy amounts referable to programs 1 to 3 that will no longer apply. The revised interim dumping duty rates are set out in the tables below.

I VARY the countervailing duty notices, with effect from 5 August 2013, as follows:

1. The countervailing duty notice in relation to aluminium zinc coated steel does not apply to exports from China by Union Steel China, Yieh Phui Technomaterial or Jiangyin Zong Cheng Steel Co. The countervailable subsidy for all remaining exporters to whom the notice applies is reduced to 10.3%.
2. The countervailing duty notice in relation to galvanised steel does not apply to exports from China by Yieh Phui Technomaterial. The countervailable subsidy for Wuhan Iron and Steel Company is reduced to 3%. The countervailable subsidy for all remaining exporters to whom the notice applies is reduced to 6.9%.

Interested parties may seek a review of this decision by lodging an application with the Federal Court of Australia, in accordance with the requirements in the *Administrative Decisions (Judicial Review) Act 1977*, within 28 days of the publication of this notice.
